This program, located at Rosecrance Griffin Williamson Adolescent Campus, allows recovering students to continue their education while receiving clinical support for their recovery. Students are able to continue coursework from their home school district or do preparatory work toward obtaining a GED (General Equivalency Diploma).

The Rosecrance team helps students recognize and build on their individual needs, while also recognizing their achievements. Our programs are tailored to help students reach their potential. Rosecrance works toward providing a path to success, not only for recovery, but also for education.

What does the Rosecrance School offer?

Rockford School District 205 assigns two certified teachers to the Rosecrance School Program.

Highlights of the Rosecrance School Program

- Academic planning
- Two-hour school day, five days a week
- Seven-classroom accredited school
- Individualized instruction
- Experiential therapy (art, fitness, life skills, music, horticulture)
- STAR testing—Math and reading assessment administered to all students
- Ability to earn grades in progress
- Academic aftercare educational planning
- Home/Hospital Individualized Education Plan (IEP) provided for all students
- Computers available for student use
- GED preparatory instruction available

Also, the Rosecrance School teaches students how to cope in a school environment. Learning how to adapt in an educational setting can help students develop new strategies to live life well in recovery when they return to school at home.

How well do Rosecrance School teachers work with home schools?

Most important to the success of our students is the communication and coordination between Rosecrance school teachers, home school teachers, and social workers/counselors. Our teachers communicate directly with the families and, if authorized, the home school counselors to discuss academic progress. The time, day, and frequency can be established upon the first contact and evaluated as clients work their way through treatment. Progress reports can be provided on a regular basis.

Frequently asked questions about the Rosecrance School

Q: If the classroom is comprised of students at different grade and educational levels, how much attention will my child receive in class?

A: Our teachers are certified and they work with students individually at the level they need. Students work at their own pace on their own individualized assignments. Also present in the classrooms are unit staff who work with the groups throughout the day and can provide support on topics where possible.

Q: What should I do to ensure that my child receives tutoring? Is there a fee involved?

A: Every effort is made to help each student maintain academic progress while in treatment. If further attention is needed, we work with Rockford University to arrange tutoring for specific needs. We can also arrange for tutoring in other subjects through the Rockford School District. There is a fee if a private tutor is required.

Q: Does the Rosecrance School program provide textbooks and assignments for the students?

A: Our school provides textbooks only if the student's curriculum is provided by Rosecrance staff. Clients are encouraged to bring their own textbooks with them

upon admission. Clients are also permitted to bring their own personal laptop computers to use during school hours. While in treatment, students are able to work on assignments provided through their home schools or by Rosecrance teachers. Clients can also prepare for the GED.

Q: Whom should I contact if I have comments or questions about a student?

A: Questions about the school and the student's progress can be answered primarily by the Rosecrance teacher and secondly by the counselor. Call us at 815.387.2546 for more information.
